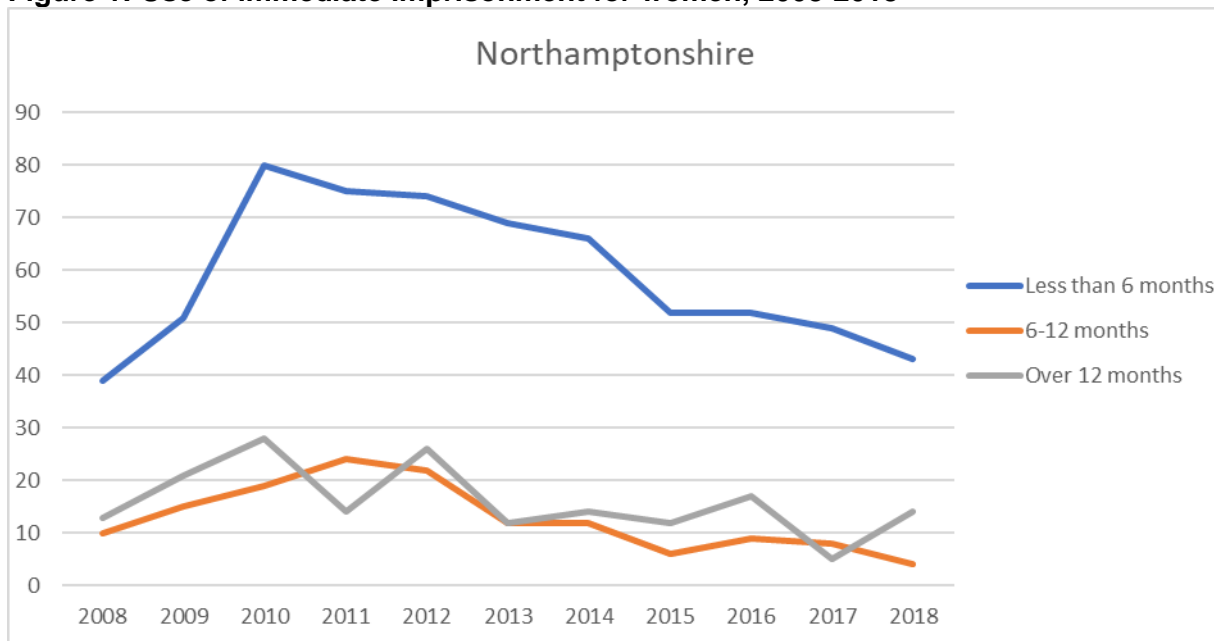


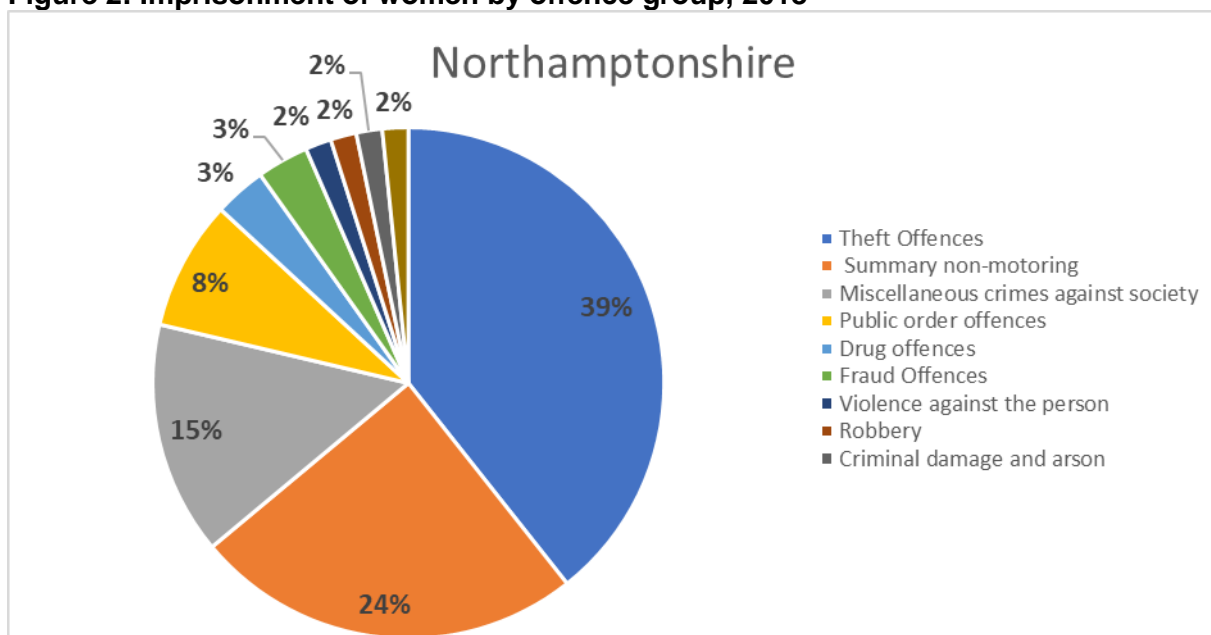
**Transforming Lives: Reducing Women’s Imprisonment  
Factsheet: Northamptonshire<sup>1</sup>**

- 61 prison sentences were given to women in Northamptonshire in 2018\*, a 2% decrease since 2008. Of those 70% were sentences of less than six months in prison.
- 39% of the prison sentences were for theft offences.
- The use of community sentences for women in Northamptonshire has decreased by 4% since 2008. The use of cautions decreased by 72% over the same period.<sup>2</sup>

**Figure 2: Imprisonment of women by offence group, 2018**

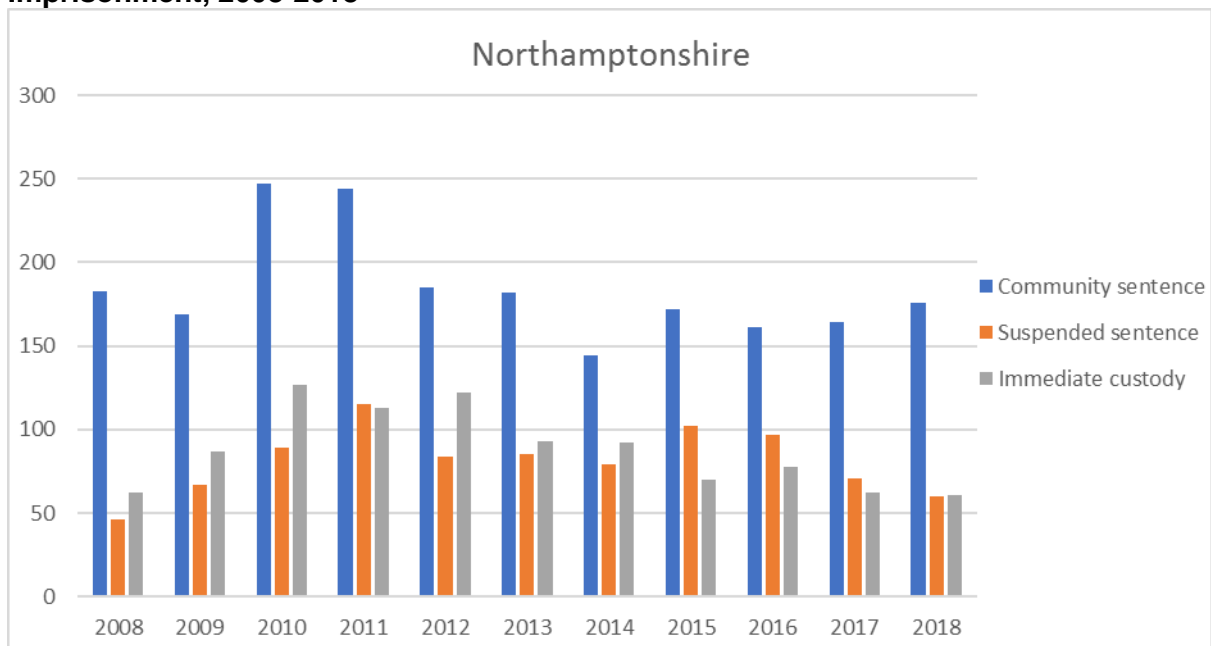

### About the Prison Reform Trust

The women's prison population in England and Wales more than doubled between 1995 and 2010 – from under 2,000 women to over 4,000. The numbers have since declined slightly to under 4,000 but this remains one of the highest rates of imprisonment for women in Western Europe.

PRT has a longstanding interest in improving criminal justice outcomes for women and we are working through our Transforming Lives programme, supported by the National Lottery Community Fund, to reduce the unnecessary imprisonment of women in the UK.
